GLOVER HISTORICAL SOCIETY (GHS)

Without doubt the highlight of 2010 for the Glover Historical Society (GHS) was the Runaway Pond Bicentennial, celebrated on June 4, 5 and 6. The GHS coordinated the generous efforts of community organizations, businesses and individuals to plan and commemorate the unique and historic letting out of Long Pond in 1810.

It was a grand observance, with many activities: student plays; Bread & Puppet Theater plays, a special commemorative stamp, cancellation and cachet envelope issue; a parade; a market on the green; a BBQ and church supper; a quilt show; evening presentations on the geology of Long Pond, life in 1810, a Google Earth trip down the path of the runaway waters, and music; natural history tours of the basin; a bus tour; beautification of Runaway Pond Park and restoration of the waterworks; balloons showing the original water depth, a re-enactment hike; a "Roar Like Thunder" museum exhibit, a shape note sing, and a special running of the "Run, Chamberlain, Run" road race. In the pouring rain, Governor Douglas helped dedicate our new VT Historical Marker at the pond site. Many descendants of the 1810 participants—the miller Aaron Willson, diggers from Glover, Sheffield, Wheelock and Barton, and Spencer Chamberlain, the man most credited as the hero of the day—joined us.

If you missed the TV coverage of the event, you can catch the clips by googling Runaway Pond and WCAX and Seven Days. And don't miss the Runaway Ponders blog! On our own website, gloverhistoricalsociety.org, you can see highlights of the weekend. We were pleased to present each student Page 40

at Glover School with a t-shirt, book or toy to thank them for their participation and enthusiasm.

In honor of the bicentennial, we published a new, expanded edition of *Runaway Pond: The Complete Story*, first published in 2001, and had more copies of Dan Cumming's children's story *Run, Chamberlain, Run* printed. We produced a DVD telling the story of Runaway Pond, and, taking inspiration from a booklet printed at the Centennial, produced our own, a *Pictorial Souvenir of the Runaway Pond Bicentennial*. Bread and Puppet Press printed a special edition of Harry Alonzo Phillips' 1931 canto *Runaway Pond*. Dennis Chamberlain, a great-great grandson of Spencer Chamberlain, wrote and published *Run, Chamberlain, Run: Solving the 200-Year-Old Mystery of Runaway Pond*. The Old Stone House reprinted the portion of James Whitelaw's 1810 map of Vermont showing the area affected by the letting out of Runaway Pond. All these publications, along with wooden souvenirs of the Bicentennial, are available at the Town Clerk's office.

We enjoyed participating at the VT History Expo in Tunbridge in June, Glover Day in July and Old Stone House Day in August with—you guessed it—an exhibit about Runaway Pond. In December, we also had tables at the Glover Craft Fair and the Moonlight Madness in Barton.

We thank all the folks who donated documents, photographs and artifacts in 2010 to our museum: Stuart Alexander, Eleanor Bailey, Ken Barber, Bread & Puppet Press, Jean Borland, Skip & Judy Borrell, Delores Chamberlain, Barbara Davis, Jim and Judi Dewing, Margaret Drew, Alverton Elliot, Jr., Marguerite Bean Fiske, Louise Kinsey, Rachel Lafont, Ellen Maas, D.J. Miles, Rebecca Munson, Jim & Nancy Rodgers, Shadow Lake Association, Jack Sumberg, Marion Taylor, Roland and Carol Woodard, Esther Coffey Young, and Jeannine Young. We are currently reconciling our list of inventoried items in our museum to the accessions list and then will begin entering all the information into a museum software program that will make searching our holdings by topic or family name or location a breeze.

In October we invited the community to the Town Hall to peruse the incredible photo albums and scrapbooks kept by Daisy Sherburne Dopp during the first half of the 20th century, a true historian of Glover, and donated by the Woodards. During the year, we have continued to help people from all over the country who are inquiring about their genealogical Glover roots.

The VT Archaeological Society's annual meeting was held at the Parker Settlement this fall, and Settlement landowners Betsy Day and Randy Williams gathered the archaeologists' ideas about how to best protect and share the history of Glover's first settlement.

Other thanks:

We appreciate the work Rick Kelley and his students at Lake Region did last spring updating our website; you can visit it at gloverhistoricalsociety.org. We hope to post the Union House ledger book pages from the early 1800s there soon, and add more Glover information and photos.

The real listed value of the town rose from \$143,656,200 to \$144,341,100, an increase of .48%. This was almost entirely new construction.

Vermont Listers are required to list all taxable property each year at its fair market value. However, listed values often do not reflect fair market value. This is because real estate markets are always changing, and because town-wide reappraisals are not conducted annually. In order to treat all municipalities fairly, it is necessary to bring grand lists to fair market values. Fair market value is the price a property is likely to bring if sold in the open market. Therefore, deriving a ratio of listed-value-to-sales-price on recent arm's-length transactions and applying that ratio to similar property types will render a reliable estimate of the total fair market value of the town. This ratio is what is known as the CLA, Common Level of Appraisal.

Glover's current Common Level of Appraisal (CLA) is now 100.72%. This is down from 101.06% last year. This is a three-year rolling average using sales from April 1, 2007 to April 1, 2010. Recent sales still show very little drop below current listed values though the number of transactions has dropped markedly since 2008.

We appreciate the continued cooperation of the property owners of Glover. Their cooperation makes this difficult and time-consuming job bearable. Thank you one and all.

All listed values of the Grand List of 2010 will be as of April 1, 2010. Changes in values and names after that date are not changed until the following year. As always we encourage your questions and concerns.

RECYCLING REPORT – 2010

The Glover Recycling Center is located south of Glover Village on Route 16 in the shed beside the town garage. It is open every first and third Saturday from 9 until noon from December through March, and every Saturday from 9 until noon from April through November. Dale Kilby is our recycling attendant.

For a charge of \$2 per visit, Glover residents can dispose of the following materials, clean and dry: clear and colored glass bottles and jars, plastic containers #1 through #7, aluminum and steel cans, corrugated cardboard, magazines and junk mail, colored and white paper, brown paper bags, aluminum foil and newspaper. We do NOT accept styrofoam or plastic bags. We now also accept used motor oil, car batteries and dry cell batteries. Rechargable batteries can be brought to the Town Clerk's Office. Glover residents can also load scrap metal into the container parked beside the shed during regular recycling hours. (Please do not bring appliances containing freon, or propane tanks.) Tires will only be collected just before Green-up Day for a small fee, to be announced, as the town will be able to move them out for a discounted rate at that time.

Materials for recycling should be separated into five categories. Newspaper (no glossy inserts or staples) is shredded into bedding for animals. Cardboard and paper bags go into a 10 yard roll-off container. #2 plastic (milk jugs and detergent bottles) should be strung on baling twine so we can throw them into the left shed for pickup once a year by a trash compactor. Our 40 cubic yard rolloff container is divided into two sections, one for containers (all glass, cans, and plastic) and the other for paper products (magazines, junk mail, boxboard, and paper). Casella Waste Management currently transports our big roll-off container to their recycling plant in Williston. Once a year we hire Austin Rubbish to come load up the entire shed full of #2 plastic to take to the Northeast Kingdom Recycling Cooperative in Lyndonville.

The town publishes an updated recycling brochure, which is enclosed with the tax bills that go out in the summer. A list of upcoming recycling events for the year is included in the information, and any changes in the materials accepted at the recycling trailer. Brochures can also be picked up at the Town Clerk's Office and Curriers' Market. We thank Jeannine Young for her work updating the brochure, and *the Chronicle* for keeping the document on their computer.

Waste USA in Coventry schedules a household hazardous waste collection day each spring and each fall. Residents of Glover can deliver paint, oil, pesticide, herbicide, toxic cleansers and other toxic chemicals from home, farm or commercial use to Waste USA on those days, at no charge. This year these events will be held on Saturday, May 14 and Saturday, October 8, from 8:30 to 11:30 A.M.

Thank you for recycling. It is one thing we CAN do for our environment.

GLOVER SCHOOL BOARD OF DIRECTORS ANNUAL MESSAGE

Looking back on the past year one would see many accomplishments. Again this year our students' NECAP scores were the highest in the district. Our student enrollment continues to increase, where other schools in our district are seeing decreases. Our current enrollment is 135. The formation of a Wellness Committee at the school has brought fresh fruits and vegetables from local farms to our school. The group plans to continue introducing more nutritious food items to our hot lunch program with the help of hot lunch director Becky Koennicke and the Farm-to-School Program. Our students are participating in the Winter Activities Program, allowing students to downhill ski, skate, cross-country ski, or snowshoe. This program allows students to stay active through the winter while experiencing activities they may not otherwise be exposed to. Parents Club and GREC continue to support our students and staff by funding field trips and special events.

Last year one of Glover's veteran teachers retired after 38 years of service. Thank you, Robert Townsend, for your dedication to our children.

This year the board was challenged by our government to cut our education spending by \$23,590, a reduction of 2.18%. This target had to be submitted to the state of Vermont by December 15th. The board worked with the business manager, Heather Wright, to meet this requirement.

As always our community has supported our school and we appreciate that. Please feel free to visit our school to see what our staff and students are accomplishing.

PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

The current enrollment for the Glover Community School is 135 students. This past year we experienced a slight decrease in population. The enrollment is expected to be in the 130's for the 2011–2012 school year.

Since the NCLB (No Child Left Behind) was legislated, Glover Community School has met AYP (Adequate Yearly Progress) based on the results of the NECAP (New England Common Assessment Program). During the month of October, students in grades 3 through 8 are assessed in the areas of math and reading. Students in grades 5 and 8 are also assessed in writing. By meeting AYP, the school has received a passing score based on state standards. Students in grades 4 and 8 will be administered the Science NECAP (New England Common Assessment Program) in the spring. We have not received the results of the October 2010 testing.

Towards the end of every school year, the staff examines the results of various assessments and other forms of data collected in planning for the upcoming school year. Since the school receives federal funding, we are required to have action plans for every school year. The current action plans focus on the areas of mathematics, literacy, technology, and school climate.

This past June and after 38 years of educational service, Robert "Bob" Townsend decided to retire. Bob served in many capacities over the years. He held both roles of principal and teacher at the Glover Community School and acted as the math and science lead teacher for the Orleans Central Supervisory Union. I wish the best to Bob in his retirement years and thank him for all that he has contributed to the school and community.

As part of the Orleans Central Supervisory Union's staff development, the teachers and staff have once again been participating in PLCs (Professional Learning Communities). The teachers and staff have an opportunity to participate in grade level and/or subject area meetings with their colleagues throughout the supervisory union.

The teachers in grades kindergarten through 5 have implemented a new math program: Bridges in Mathematics. The program was funded through the Consolidated Federal Program (CFP). The teachers have also been taking part in a year long course focusing on the implementation of the program.

The Glover Community School is in the second year of the ARRA (American Recovery and Reinvestment Act) funding as part of the stimulus package to schools. We were fortunate to hire a full-time literacy specialist to assist with our students and teachers.

In late summer 2010, schools across the state were asked to cut their overall budgets through new education legislation, Act 146: Challenges for Change. Statewide the reductions ranged from 0.5 % to 2.68%. For Glover, it meant a 2.18% or \$23,590 decrease from the previous year's budget. Glover Community School met the required budget cut.

Act 153: Voluntary Merger was another piece of new education legislation. This legislation requires that each supervisory union school board in the state discuss the merger of districts. Supervisory union boards are required to vote on whether to pursue an analysis of possible merger of school boards before October 1, 2012.

On behalf of the Glover Community School, I would like to thank the Glover School Board for their commitment, hard work, and dedication representing the school and community. I would also like to thank the Glover community for their ongoing support to the school. The students, staff, and I would like to invite the members of the community to the Glover Community School. Our staff works closely with seniors and their families offering assistance with Medicare, Social Security, Medicaid, public assistance programs, in-home services and many other types of help. There is no charge for services provided by the agency.

BARTON SENIOR CENTER

The Barton Senior Center serves many of the residents of Glover. Seniors from the area attend Strong Living exercise classes and some for almost five years. This strength training class began in 2005 and has been very beneficial. Some of the Glover residents are on the board of directors, help with fundraisers and make the Barton Senior Center an extremely important part of their lives.

They begin Tuesdays and Thursdays by arriving to either exercise or play cards and stay for bingo or live music, then enjoy a nutritious meal, which is followed by line dancing, ballroom or square dancing. They also attend special fundraisers such as the Fifth Friday Jam Session. The Barton Senior Center has its own garden and fresh produce is served. A nutritious, well-balanced meal is provided as well as a chance for socialization to residents of your town. Some residents have participated in the blood pressure/blood sugar clinics and in the recent pumpkin pie contest, and the Halloween costume contest. We have a working partnership with the Glover School and they send three to five students to the center each month. Senior centers help seniors stay in their own homes, keeping them healthy and active.

FRONTIER ANIMAL SOCIETY OF VERMONT, INC.

Frontier Animal Society of Vermont, Inc. is now in its 17th year of operation, and we are all proud of the service we have given to the communities of Orleans and Northern Essex counties. Such service would not have been possible without the financial support of the many towns who appropriate funds to help our hundreds of unwanted dogs and cats. Frontier continues to hold low cost spay/neuter clinics for cats every three to four weeks.

GREEN UP VERMONT

Green Up Day celebrated 40 years in 2010. Many towns reported record turnouts, and numerous volunteers reported less trash than in previous years.

With your town's help, we can continue our unique annual Vermont tradition of taking care of our beautiful landscape and promoting civic pride so our children grow up with Green Up. Children are our future, and Green Up Vermont focuses on education for grades K-12 with activities such as a curriculum for K-4, activity booklets, a story and drawing booklet, and the annual poster and writing contests. LAKE REGION SENIOR CENTER

We derive our income from appropriations, donations, and fundraisers and grants. This year we were lucky enough to receive a grant for the purchase of locally grown produce, to help pay for a new furnace and a new refrigerator. We will be getting another grant this year to buy locally grown produce. The amounts appropriated by the towns for 2010 are from Albany - \$200, Brownington - \$600, Barton Town - \$5,500, Irasburg - \$300, and Westmore - \$200.

We want to thank the towns and villages for their appropriations, as well as the individual people and organizations who have given us donations, and the volunteers who have given their time to make the Lake Region Senior Center a success. We would not be able to continue without the support that we receive from all of them.

We estimate our budget for the year 2011 to be \$40,000.

We serve anywhere from 50 to 65 dinners, which includes 10 to 14 takeout dinners to our homebound clients, on Wednesdays and Fridays to seniors from Orleans, Barton, Albany, Brownington, Glover, Irasburg, Westmore, and Newport. This averages out to 400 to 520 meals a month. Once a month we have a Birthday Dinner with entertainment and on the 1st and 3rd Wednesday of every month we play bingo.

NEKCA ORLEANS COUNTY COURT DIVERSION

Court Diversion is a community response to first-time juvenile and adult offenders. A Review Board composed of community residents reviews cases after the offender has met certain program criteria. The Review Board designs a contract that specifies the conditions of the offender's participation. If the offender satisfactorily completes the contract, the State's Attorney dismisses the charges. The contract typically includes an apology and restitution to the victim, community service, and other remedial, educational or corrective services. Approximately 87% of those referred to Court Diversion successfully complete their contracts. In addition, Diversion is cost effective; it takes far less money to process a case through Diversion than through Court, and the Diversion process is controlled by community people with vested interest in making sure there are not repeat offenses.

GREEN MOUNTAIN FARM-TO-SCHOOL, INC.

Green Mountain Farm-to-School (GMFTS) is a nonprofit organization providing fresh, local food and nutrition education to over 5,000 students at 24 schools in northern Vermont.

GMFTS coordinates student and community involvement in the Glover School Garden. Over the last year, 49 Glover students participated in our Sprouts School Garden Program, an after-school program that promotes healthy food choices through hands-on gardening and cooking activities. Through the program, we work with students to design, plant, and harvest the school garden and we teach our comprehensive curriculum, consisting of 24 standardized workshops on topics ranging from gardening, farming, nutrition, and cooking. Students started seeds for the garden at the school and the entire school participated in a spring Garden Dedication Ceremony. The garden produced over 100 pounds of food that was served to students in the school cafeteria. GMFTS also coordinates community volunteers who help maintain the garden over the summer.

NORTHEASTERN VERMONT DEVELOPMENT ASSOCIATION (NVDA)

In 2010, the Northeastern Vermont Development Association (NVDA) continued its longstanding tradition of service to the communities of the three counties of the Northeast Kingdom as the regional planning and economic development corporation. In Glover this past year, NVDA performed energy audits on your town hall, municipal offices, and fire station. We also prepared a basic emergency operations plan and assisted the town with a Vermont Community Development Program grant.

NORTHEAST KINGDOM HUMAN SERVICES, INC.

The mission of Northeast Kingdom Human Services, Inc. (NKHS), is to enrich communities and enhance the ability of individuals and families to improve their lives. Our agency provides services to individuals with severe and persistent mental illness; children with severe emotional disturbance and their families; individuals with developmental disabilities, including mental retardation and autism; individuals with alcohol and drug problems; and a 24-hour, seven-dayweek crisis intervention program provided for the general public.

Northeast Kingdom Human Services is primarily funded with state and federal dollars through the Medicaid program. Services are provided regardless of an individual's ability to pay. The financial support we receive from the local towns in Orleans, Essex, and Caledonia counties are directed toward supporting

psychiatry positions to meet the demands from our community for services that are not funded. NKHS is a private not for profit 501(c)(3) corporation.

NORTHEAST KINGDOM LEARNING SERVICES, INC.

As always, demand for adult education services remains very high. To date this year, we have provided over 10,000 hours of direct instruction to 556 students. Of those students, 106 have earned a high school diploma or GED certificate.

Northeast Kingdom Learning Services, Inc. (NEKLS) has an exciting new program that allows students 21 years or older to earn a high school diploma through project based learning. The Adult Diploma Program is a perfect fit for students who are too old to enter into the High School Completion Program (ages 16-22), but who are determined to earn a high school diploma. Additionally, NEKLS continues to have one of the best GED programs in the state.

Your support of the Adult Education and Literacy program has always been important and it will remain so in 2011. State and federal budget challenges have impacted the funding of community organizations such as NEKLS. We anticipate additional problems in the coming year. As a result, our town funds are vital to our efforts to introduce new instructional options and maintain high program quality.

NORTHERN VERMONT RESOURCE CONSERVATION & DEVELOPMENT (RC&D) COUNCIL

Our current projects include rural fire protection through the dry hydrant grant program, water quality improvement work through the portable skidder bridge free loan and education program, natural resources education through the High School Envirothon and 5th grade Vermont Forests Forever programs, watershed restoration work and roads management grants through the Better Backroads grant program. Do you have a project or program that could use some assistance to "make it happen"? Over the years the Northern Vermont RC&D Council has helped many communities and organizations on a variety of projects. We work on a request basis, so the first step is up to you, giving us a call. ORLEANS COUNTY CITIZEN ADVOCACY

Orleans County Citizen Advocacy's mission is to bring community volunteers (called advocates) and people with developmental disabilities together in oneto- one relationships of friendship and advocacy. OCCA's goal is for people with disabilities to be valued, protected, and accepted in their communities. Since our part-time program began in 1989, over 70 matches have been made, thanks to the support from large-hearted people in our communities. ORLEANS COUNTY HISTORICAL SOCIETY THE OLD STONE HOUSE MUSEUM

For more than 150 years, the Orleans County Historical Society has worked to preserve and share the rich and fascinating history of our county and our region. The Society preserves and cares for the five historic buildings of the Old Stone House Museum complex, along with remarkable collections of furniture, paintings, clothing, tools, photographs, diaries, maps and letters that all illustrate aspects of our unique regional heritage. In addition to its preservation efforts, the Historical Society works to tell the stories of our region's past through engaging exhibits, educational programs and public events. The Society will also be sponsoring the annual Collectors' Fair, the Antique Gas and Steam Engine Show, Old Stone House Day, Time Travelers' Day Camp, Heritage Craft Workshops, lectures, concerts and traditional craft circles. More than 1,200 schoolchildren from Orleans County will participate in educational programs sponsored by the Society. These include on-site events such as Spring Field Day and Fall Harvest Day, and off-site events like the enormously popular Northeast Kingdom History Fair.

As a local nonprofit organization, the Orleans County Historical Society faces serious financial challenges in its efforts to maintain its buildings, collections and programs. Each year, the Historical Society seeks and receives support for special projects and programs through grants and restricted gifts, but the struggle to meet day-to-day operating expenses continues. In recent years, support from Orleans County towns has played an important role in helping the Society to maintain the quality of its work.

ORLEANS-ESSEX VNA and HOSPICE, INC.

Orleans-Essex Visiting Nurse Association (VNA) and Hospice, Inc. provides professional quality home health services to the residents of the 24 communities in Orleans and northern Essex counties. We serve the elderly, homebound and chronically ill through the VNA and homemaker programs, and the terminally ill through our Hospice program. Special programs include a variety of clinics available to the public. As the only not-for-profit agency serving the area, our services are available to anyone in need regardless of their ability to pay and all clients are charged the same fee for the same service. We are locally controlled by a volunteer board of directors representing the towns we serve.

During Fiscal Year 2010, home-based services were provided to 24 individuals in Glover for a total of 610 multi-disciplinary visits. Thirty residents received services through agency-sponsored wellness programs.

RURAL COMMUNITY TRANSPORTATION, INC. (RCT)

RCT is a nonprofit corporation providing transportation to the elderly and disabled, Medicaid and general public through a van/bus and volunteer service. Between all of our programs, RCT provides over 170,000 rides per year. RCT transports people to adult day service facilities, senior meal sites and necessary medical treatments such as dialysis, radiation therapy, chemotherapy, physical therapy, special medical needs and other appointments. RCT has provided residents of Glover with 839 trips, accumulating approximately 28,462 miles over the past year.

SHADOW LAKE ASSOCIATION

The Shadow Lake Association would like to ask the voters of the town of Glover to appropriate \$5,000 to the running of the boat wash. It runs from Memorial Day to Labor Day at Shadow Lake. The lake association has been running this for several years with annual contributions from association members augmented by grant assistance from the state of Vermont and other private foundations, and town support through payroll processing and liability insurance. The appropriations from the state of Vermont to the town of Glover/Shadow Lake Association have been reduced substantially in the last couple of years leaving the association with a payment to the town between \$3,500 to \$4,000. To continue the efforts of preserving the recreational opportunities provided by the lake and its natural resources for all to enjoy, we need to ask for financial assistance from the greater Glover community on an annual basis.

The boat wash operates 12 hours per day, five days per week, employing local area residents as attendants. While the goal would be to run it 7 days per week, the financial reality is that we will struggle to maintain our current level of operation without further assistance.

If milfoil ever finds its way into Shadow Lake it will have a devastating effect on the fishing, swimming and boating activities available at the lake. An infestation would likely have a severe negative impact on the public beach as milfoil thrives in shallow waters.

Should milfoil establish itself in Shadow Lake it will also have a negative economic impact upon the Glover community. Lake Morey has lost a lot of property value over the state of milfoil in that body of water. Lake Willoughby has invested approximately \$40,000 each year to pay divers to pull this invasive species that grows back every year. There is no treatment for this weed currently once it is established in a lake. Prevention, such as boat washes and education, are the only actions we can take to help stop it from ever getting into Shadow Lake.

With financial support from the town, we can continue these efforts to protect the lake, preserving the lake environment along with its recreation, and the revenue that is generated each year from people that are using the lake, and spending time and money in the town of Glover.

UMBRELLA

The Advocacy Program saw an increase of more than 30% in the number of individuals served. 815 women, men and children throughout the Northeast Kingdom received crisis support, safety planning, and help in navigating criminal justice and human service agencies. In the 10 months that the Horizon House shelter was fully operational we provided 1,640 nights of emergency housing to 43 adults and 72 children. We strive to connect participants with community resources and improve their ability to safety plan, and we are pleased to share that 100% of follow-up survey respondents report that we've succeeded in these goals. But post-crisis intervention is only part of the Advocacy Program's purpose. In 2010 we also provided educational presentations and prevention groups to 864 adults and children, and launched a sexual violence prevention pilot project in conjunction with North Country Union High School.

The Family Room saw a dramatic increase in the numbers of families utilizing our safe, child-friendly supervised visitation program in 2010. The NEKwide program served 129 families in our St. Johnsbury and Newport locations, supporting noncustodial parents as they create or restore nurturing relationships with their children.

VERMONT ASSOCIATION FOR THE BLIND AND VISUALLY IMPAIRED (VABVI)

Since 1926, VABVI, a nonprofit organization, has diligently pursued our mission of enabling Vermonters with vision problems, whether blindness or impairment, to achieve and maintain independence. VERMONT CENTER FOR INDEPENDENT LIVING (VCIL)

VCIL works to serve individuals who can benefit from our direct services as well as to educate and inform individuals who can benefit from our direct services as well as to educate and inform members of the community about disability related issues and independent living. Peer counselors work with residents in their homes; small grants for adaptive equipment; Meals on Wheels for people under the age of 60; Home Access modifications; individual and systems advocacy and programs for youth. AUDITORS' STATEMENT

In accordance with Section 1681 of Title 24, V.S.A., we have examined the accounts and records of the Town of Glover. To the best of our knowledge, the financial statements and reports show the financial position of the Town for the fiscal year ending December 31, 2010.

The Glover School District accounts are audited by a CPA firm every three years. We have reviewed the most recent report from Besaw & Associates of Newport.

We have examined the accounts and records on a quarterly basis and recommend that this practice be continued.
